SOCIAL JUSTICE **DIGITAL ARTEFACTS** COMMUNITY ACTIVISM

Over the course of a 48 – 64 hour virtual practicum, undergraduate students engaged in service learning by creating digital artefacts to address, solve, and/or educate the public on social justice issues within the Greater-Vancouver community.

Students worked closely with their practicum hosts and course instructor, Greg Chan, on selfguided projects while learning skills of project management, report writing, audio-visual communications, and virtual presentations.

Historic Joy Kogawa House ARCHIVAL RESEARCH - EDUCATIONAL CONTENT - SOCIAL JUSTICE

Parm was placed at the Historic Joy Kogawa House, home of acclaimed Canadian author Joy Kogawa, with the goal of developing website content honouring the rescue of the home from demolition, aimed at both the general public and school aged children.



Aleisha developed an adaptable walking tour of Vancouver's False Creek. She created the itinerary and script with guidance from the Vancouver Maritime Museum. The tour tells the story of the inlet, drawing attention to impacts on the environment and the Indigenous peoples.

Emily created and implemented a public outreach plan, including a social media campaign and series of faculty presentations, to raise awareness of the KPU Tiny Homes Project, an experiential learning initiative that explores alternative social solutions.
